

Topic 15 Exercise 3 – Reactions of Complex Ions

- 1. Write equations to show the reactions taking place in the following processes, and state the types of reaction taking place.
- a) If aqueous sodium hydroxide solution is added to a solution of iron (II) chloride, a dirty green precipitate appears which is insoluble in excess sodium hydroxide.
- b) If aqueous sodium hydroxide solution is added to a solution of aluminium (III) sulphate, a white precipitate appears which dissolves in excess sodium hydroxide to give a colourless solution.
- c) If aqueous ammonia is added to a solution of copper (II) sulphate, a pale blue precipitate appears which dissolves in excess ammonia to give a deep blue solution.
- d) If concentrated hydrochloric acid is added to an aqueous solution of cobalt (II) nitrate, the solution turns blue. If the mixture is then diluted, it reverts to its original pink colour.
- e) If aqueous sodium carbonate is added to an aqueous solution of aluminium sulphate, a white precipitate is formed and a gas is given off.
- f) If aqueous sodium carbonate is added to an aqueous solution of cobalt (II) sulphate, a pink precipitate is formed and no gas is given off.
- 2. Explain why a 1.0 moldm⁻³ solution of iron (II) nitrate has a higher pH than a 1.0 moldm⁻³ solution of iron (III) nitrate.
- 3. Explain why the reaction between $[Cu(H_2O)_6]^{2+}$ and edta⁴⁻ ions is thermodynamically favoured.
